Official's Commissioner Report - 2012-13

The PEISAA member schools, along with the executive, and the provincial sport organization Officials' Associations, continue to have a healthy working relationship. As an Association, we continue to be supportive in helping to build the various Officials' Associations to improve the level of officiating and the number of officials taking part in school sport.

Sports officials represent a critical aspect of the sporting infrastructure, yet those responsible for officiating athletic contests are leaving sport at an alarming rate. This is more prevalent in our younger officials. (those in their first and second year). Some cases are unavoidable, i.e leaving the province. A recent study," Understanding the Factors Contributing to the Retention of Canadian Sports Officials", published by Livingston & Forbes from Lakehead University, cites that many of our officials leave their sport for reasons due to lack of support, abusive behavior, and or attrition.

Every Official's Association in PEI is experiencing difficulty in this area. Recruitment is an ongoing and daunting task. Few of the Associations would be considered as healthy with respect to the number of officials they are working with. Some Associations have shown some growth while others are merely existing. Recruitment and retention of officials in the extremities of the province in particular is challenging. Member schools can help in identifying and promoting officiating within their community to improve our officiating numbers in all areas of the province, thus reducing some of the financial burden placed on our schools.

An ongoing concern is the number of incidents involving negative behavior directed toward officials during interscholastic play by players, coaches, and spectators. Member schools must continue to be diligent in promoting fair play, and that these individuals must be responsible and encouraged to be respectful of our officials.

Our sincerest thanks to all officials throughout the province, they provide an incredible service and should be commended for their dedication and valuable contribution to School Athletics. Our appreciation is also noted to all the member schools and individuals who took on the responsibility of running events at the Provincial Track & Field Championships. It takes an army of volunteers and officials to ensure the success of such an event.

Congratulations to the 2013 PEISAA official of the year.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION Media Commissioner Report 2012-13

The use of media to promote the activities within the PEISAA I feel, has had its best year ever. The biggest reason for this stems from great support by the sport editors at the Journal Pioneer and the Guardian, Jason Simmonds and Jason Malloy.

The Journal Pioneer on top of reporting nightly results and stories dedicated a full page to school sport every Wednesday. The majority of this was done by their own reporters. As well, the Guardian gave PEISAA stories excellent exposure and used their own staff to include action photos of sport throughout the entire year. Most weeks would see one or two photos of our athletes in action.

This year a player of the week was chosen for Senior Basketball and with the support of Milk Sport and the Summerside Storm these players received complementary tickets to Storm games. This initiative could be expanded for midget sport and other senior sport if the schools express interest at scheduling meetings.

Again, the toughest challenge is in the game reporting process which has substantially improved but there are still too many games not reported on time and then not into media. Some games, particularly in basketball with late starts can not avoid this but midget sport and fall sport should not have difficulty meeting the time lines.

The PEISAA website has had a strong viewing audience and the more information provided, the better the product can be. An example, is the Senior Basketball league used a page that included all game results with scores and standings included up to date daily in a chart throughout the season.

A suggestion: Commissioners make a priority in having the tournament managers or home team hosts for playoff games for each championship send a brief report for all playoff games to the media rep so that a story can be included in the papers the next morning. This needs only a couple lines including key plays, points of interest in the game, turning points, players of the game etc. As well, the website needs to completed immediately following these games with the scores and scorers. Without this cooperation only the games covered by media staff itself will be reported on time. This is presently a weakness.

Another needed area of improvement is the commissioner's use of the website to provide standings for their leagues on a regular basis, at least weekly, throughout the season. The media commissioner is available to compare results from what is on the website to what the commissioners receive by faxed game reports, in an effort to ensure with a second set of eyes that statistics are correct

2. GENERAL COMMENTS

This is a great way to have your league finish as there was a great deal of parity. The AAA leagues were competitive for the most part as the final standings will attest.

Many thanks go out to the assigners, Cory Deagle in the East and Richard Pettipas in the West, they did a terrific job making sure games were covered. Hats of to our officials for getting to the fields in "light hours," we realize how difficult it is to get to the field at our kick-off times. Other thanks go out to Paperflow (Xerox and Sam Jeyes), The Department of Education and Early Childhood, Rick MacKinnon (PEISAA Sport Coordinator), and the many coaches and players who provided many hours of entertaining soccer this fall.

Results were a process that was difficult to keep up with. Athletic Directors need to be checking in with these on a more regular basis. 3. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

There were a few positions not determined until that Saturday afternoon (which was also the same day as the Prov. Cross Country day so many were at that venue)
- 4. Better reporting of games, need I say more!

With the help of PEISAA Fun Stick equipment, Jana Doucette (coach) and Deana Chaisson (teacher rep), the 2012 Queen Charlotte team had a successful season. The new Shoot-out competition for overtime replaced the penalty stroke competition at both the junior & high school level. January, 2013 Field Hockey Canada will add two new rules for the upcoming summer season. The Universities played these new rules this season. More study is required. Field hockey numbers are growing and there is a need for more coaches. Stephen Goosen offered a Community Coaching course in September. It is hoped to offer another course in January or February in Summerside.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3. To schedule the high school and midget quarter final games so that the team winning would have a school day to practice. Both games were held on Friday, Oct 19th. Semi finals for high school were Monday and midget on Tuesday.

- 4. Number of playing days: The 2012 high school season had 7 playing days in the month of September and four days in October. (Mon, Wed and Friday) for the following reasons. a) School started later in September, therefore the first game scheduled was Sept 14th.
 - b) Thanksgiving Weekend. Teams don't play on the Friday of Thanksgiving and Thanksgiving Monday.
 - c) The National Club Soccer Tournament took a week out of our schedule for turf from Tuesday, Oct 2th to Monday, Oct 8th.
 - d) Teachers Convention... no games on Thursday or Friday.

4. General Comments

The Pre Novice - Midget Cross Country season ended with the 2012 Source for Sports Provincial Cross Country Championship at Mill River Provincial Park on Saturday, October 20th. The

championship was hosted by the Westisle Family of Schools. The weather was a bit wet but conditions were still good for running. A total of 701 runners ran the 4 competitive courses. This was a decrease of 22 runners from last year's participation numbers. We had an increase of 19 runners from Pre Novice to Novice categories and a decrease of 46 runners from Bantam to Midget categories. The Juvenile /Senior Championships were held at Charlottetown Rural High School on Thursday, October 18th. The meet managers were Mike Lloyd and Esther Hovingh. A total of 170 runners ran the 2 competitive courses in great weather. This total was also an increase of 6 runners from last year's total.

The overall PEISAA Provincial Championship participation was 871 runners. This was a decrease of 16 runners.

The schedule had the Midget and Bantam categories compete first in the morning and the Novice and Pre Novice categories competed in the afternoon. All started on time and finished on time.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The 2012-13 Midget golf season experienced a significant change with the move to a fall season. Coaches felt that their athletes were much better prepared for the season after playing all summer. The qualifying scores and Provincial Championship results would appear to lead to that conclusion as well. Participation numbers were down this year, hopefully only a result of the short preparation time for schools. Next year will give a better representation of the effect of the change of seasons. 78 boys and 8 girls were involved in the qualifying tournaments with 34 moving on to the Provincials hosted at Avondale Golf Club. A minimum of two, 9 hole qualifying tournaments were held in each of the competing sport zones..

This resulted in 28 boys and 6 girls being involved in the championship. The championship was hosted at Avondale Golf Club with a very reasonable green fee of \$18 being charged for the boy's 18 hole championship and \$10 for the girl's 9 hole championship. Avondale's Director of Golf, Scott Larsen and his staff must be thanked for the terrific work they did to help facilitate the championship.

Thanks to all the coaches for the time they put into this year's golf season, they continue to try and promote the inclusion of girls in their program with mixed results. There was only 1 team of girls this year plus 3 individual entries, a decrease over last year, hopefully the numbers will trend up next year. Thanks to Rick MacKinnon for all the advice and administrative help.

5. Recommendations:

1. Emphasize the importance of administrating the qualifying tournaments through the office of the zone representatives.

- 2. Maintain the championship qualification format, the addition of individual participants qualifying for the Provincial Championship allowed a few extra competitors to attend the Provincials even though their school did not qualify or field a full team.
- 3. With midget schools moving the golf season to the fall, it is important that the qualifying tournaments be scheduled in the spring to insure the fall qualification tournament schedule is completed in time for the Provincial Championships.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS:

This year twenty-eight teams, representing ten high schools, afforded the opportunity to about three hundred and forty student-athletes to hit the hardwood and play basketball in league play, and then play-offs, leading to six championships overseen by the PEISAA.

- 5. Athletic directors keep in mind that scheduling of games can affect seedings. If schools schedule too light a schedule in terms of competition, or too heavy a schedule, then sometimes the seeding committee may be forced to seed appropriately.

4.General Comments:

Overall, I thought the midget basketball season ran very smoothly. Game reports, for the most part, were faxed in on time and results were accurate. Any games cancelled were re-scheduled right away. The leagues seemed very competitive with the exception of the "AA" Girls league. There were one sided games with two teams dominating the standings. This was frustrating for the teams on both ends.

5. Recommendations:

- 1. Stay with the man-to- man defense but prior to the start of the basketball season, have a clinic for coaches and referees responsible for the midget games to demonstrate what is legal in a man-to-man and what is considered zone.
- 2. I would like to see regular season league all-stars added to the midget age athletics in a similar way that the high school system does it. The coaches from the east division could meet and vote to make up the east all-star team and the west could do the same. There could be a game between the two teams if there is interest in that, but it is not necessary. I do think that the players that excel throughout the

regular season are acknowledge as there is a lot of time and effort put in by all the players. (fwd. by Trent Whitty/Stonepark).

3. The games are currently 32 minutes long. I feel that if the games were extended to 40 minutes, players would have more time to use the skills that are developed in practice. By extending the game by 8 minutes, there would be more possessions in the game allowing for greater development to occur. The other factor that makes this a compelling rule change is that teams would have to go a little deeper into their bench, giving more time for those bench players to get in-game experience. Having 12-14 players on a team, I find it difficult to find time for everyone in many of the games. If the quarters were extended to 10 minutes, I would find it a lot easier to get everyone into the game. (fwd. by Trent Whitty/Stonepark) 4. Right now, in the "AA" league, teams play 12 games each. This is 4 games against each team. If we move to the high school model where teams make up their schedule including 1 or 2 point games and rank the teams at the end of the season for "A" or "AA" status, teams will not have to face the same teams and the same results for an entire season.

4. General Comments

The 2013 school gymnastics season ended on Saturday, February 16th with the PEI School Athletic Association Provincial Gymnastics Championship at Kensington Intermediate Senior High School. The championship was hosted by St. Louis Elementary School. Provincial team titles: West Kent Elementary- Pre Novice Boys, St. Louis Elementary - Pre Novice Girls, West Kent Elementary - Novice Girls, West Royalty Elementary - Novice Boys. Montague Intermediate - Bantam boy's and girl's team titles, Montague Intermediate- Midget Girls. The top five scores on each event were used to calculate the team standing. Individual awards were also given to the top six vault /floor routines and top ten all around. A total of 317 gymnasts participated at this year's event. This was an increase of 28 gymnasts from last year's total.

On Saturday morning the competition started and finished on time. A total of 142 gymnasts participated with 90 Pre Novice Girls and 52 Pre Novice Boys. Increase of 4

On Saturday afternoon, another big crowd watched 129 gymnasts perform in the Novice Boys, Novice Girls categories, 53 Novice Boys and 76 Novice Girls. Increase of 6.

The late afternoon we had a total of 46 gymnasts participate in Bantam Boys and Girls, Midget Boys and Girls categories, 9 Bantam Boys, 26 Bantam Girls, 1 Midget Boy and 10 Midget Girls. All information and results were posted in the three local papers and two radio stations. The media coverage before and after was very good. All results were circulated the next day to all the media's, schools and on our SAA web. site within days of our championship.

We had a total of 24 different schools from across PEI participate with a total of 317 gymnasts, an increase of 28 gymnasts.

We also had one new school, John J. Sark Memorial and the return of the Bloomfield Elementary School.

The weather finally cooperated with us and traveling was great.

We had a total of 450 paid spectators; this also was an increase of 45 spectators.

Our computer program, which calculated the results, came through for us again. Within minutes of the end of both competitions, the results were handed out.

I would like to say a special thank you to Rick MacKinnon for helping me leading up and during the championship.

I would also like to thank Marybeth Rogers and her administration for all their help and continuous support. Thank you for allowing us to use your fine facility to host our Provincial Championship. It is very much appreciated.

We can't forget PEI School milk Foundation for their continuous support and of course for the free chocolate milk for all the competitors.

Thank you to all the Unit managers for hosting their own zone competitions and sending me all the results on time. A special thank you to all the Phys.Ed. teachers for getting your athletes ready to compete. Great job! It's always a pleasure to work with such dedicated professionals.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The 2013 P.E.I.S.A.A. Wrestling Championships were held on Friday evening for the Bantam and Midget divisions and on Saturday for the Novice competitors. The site was the new Montague Regional High School. The venue saw 3 mat surfaces in the gymnasium. This format was used both Friday evening and Saturday. On Friday evening there were 89 Bantam, Midget & Senior competitors. 113 athletes qualified for the Provincial Championships. On Saturday with the Novice divisions 3 mats were used for 176 competitors. 195 athletes qualified for the Provincial Competition.

The format for wrestling was changed for the Saturday session. The Novice competition was divided into a morning and afternoon division with low weight classes wrestling from 9am to 12:30pm and the higher weight classes wrestling from 1pm to completion (approximately 4pm). This format received a lot of positive feedback and can be used with the mat to wrestler ratio that we had in the Novice divisions.

The on mat official situation saw 4 officials being used each session. All officials were Nationally ranked, with the exception of one aspirant used on Saturday. One new National "A" official is prepared to become the new head official for Wrestling PEI and will provide feedback from that perspective for this event.

The numbers of wrestlers at the upper level continues to be an area for improvement and some initial steps to improve this area are noted in the recommendations.

The weigh-in system should be reviewed to ensure a fair and consistent process. The issues here are that the weigh-in cannot be on the day of the tournament, due to the numbers of draws necessary. It took approximately 16-18 man hours to prepare the draw for the two days. This does not include the time during the tournament. This means that a weigh-in format must be completed before the competition. This could be done if all athletes were weighed consistently prior to or during zone tournaments. This format seemed to run smoothly this year, but could use feedback.

Overall this was a very successful event. The total number of 265 competitors continues to show growth in the sport. The challenge is to continue to develop the sport into the Intermediate and to a greater degree and then into the high schools. The team results are listed on page 2 of this report

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. If there is only one athlete registered in a weight class for the PEISAA Championships the athlete will receive a medal, but no team points. Athlete is not required to come to the competition.
- 2. If there are two or more athletes who are registered in a weight class and an athlete comes to the PEISAA Championships prepared to fight and due to one or more no shows is not required to fight, the athlete will receive a medal and full team points.
- 3. All Senior athletes will be eligible to compete at the PEISAA Championships.
- 4. In the Midget category, the top four athletes at Zone competitions qualify for the PEISAA Championships.
- 5. Review Bantam female weight categories to align with current weights of students at that level

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The PEISAA/Black Knight provincial badminton championships were held on Thursday April 25 and Saturday April 27, at 5 Summerside and area locations.

Championship titles in novice, bantam, midget, juvenile and senior boys and girls' categories were all up for grabs in singles, doubles and mixed play. Most of our Island schools were represented in zone playoffs, with the top two from the four zones advancing to the provincials.

Jesse Cameron from Three Oaks was victorious in senior boy's singles defeating Joel Arsenault from Evangeline 21-18, 24-26 and 21-15 to win the provincial title. Nick Trainor of Rural defeated Alex Cyr of Evangeline 12-21, 21-17 and 21-19 to claim the senior boys bronze medal. In doubles action Luke MacKinnon and Riley Cameron from TOSH defeated Jesse Cameron and Colin Loerick of TOSH 23-21, 16-21 and 21-17 to win the title. The bronze medal was won by Evangeline with Jason Gallant and Joel Arsenault defeating Michael Clory and Heletha Hewagama of Gray 21-16 and 22-20. With a first and second in doubles and a first in singles TOSH won the provincial title with13 points.

In girls' action, Ryan Jinks of Rural defeated Marcie McRae of Westisle 21-15 and 21-18 to win the senior girls provincial singles championship. Megan Llewellyn from Bluefield defeated Jessica Gillis of Three Oaks 21-15 and 21-16 to claim the bronze medal in singles. Megan Llewellyn and Amy Dawson defeated Briar Roberts and Hillary MacLeod from Kinkora 21-9 and 21-14 to win the senior girls doubles championship. Ryann Jinks and Emily Cairns of Rural defeated Kelly Curley and Jessica Gillis 21-16 and 21-18 to claim the bronze. There was a tie for the provincial championship between Bluefield and Rural. 3. GENERAL COMMENTS

This rugby season successful yet again. Players from all across the island compete in 3 divisions in men and women's championships. This season would not have been possible without countless hours of hard work by players, most notably, as well as coaches, referees and Athletic Directors. Special thanks to Darryl Boudreau for his continued work as Referee Assignor, and to Rick MacKinnon as School Sport Coordinator. Additional credit should also be directed to Joel Arsenault, Alex Field and Charla Currie for their contribution as championship site managers. Without the work of the people mentioned above and the dozens who are not, it would not be possible to have high school rugby on PEI.

As is the case with every season, the progression from the first games to the playoffs in A rugby is remarkable. They begin the season as athletes frantically trying to score and stop the other team from scoring with little knowledge of the game. Then, every season, the teams are running set plays and reading their opposition. I also feel that the A division, with 8 players on the field per team, allows the student athletes to adjust to playing a contact sport. Playing with fewer players on the field helps in teaching safety, as well as sportsmanship in a sport as highly competitive as rugby. In both men and women's championships, the season came down to finals decided by a single try with Colonel Gray winning in women's and Charlottetown Rural in men's.

In the AA and AAA divisions, the high level of play and relative parity of teams was very good to see. The AA women's final was between Westisle and Montague, who both had close games with the AAA teams during the regular season. Montague came out on top in an exciting final that needed overtime. In the AA men's final, Souris was able to beat Colonel Gray in a game that was not decided until the final whistle. In the AAA women's division, all 4 teams were closely matched through the regular season, which made for exciting playoffs. This all came together with a final between Charlottetown Rural and Three Oaks, with Charlottetown Rural winning in an overtime thriller. The AAA men's division was also tightly matched, with Three Oaks proving to be the best of the four teams in the regular season and in playoffs with a decisive, yet exciting win in the final over Bluefield.

This season was the first in which coaches and ADs were given the option of scanning and emailing pdfs of game sheets instead of by fax. I felt that this would give some coaches the opportunity to send game sheets in from home if they did not have access to a fax machine. This was the preferred method for sending in game sheets, however I only received about 75 percent of them. On a positive note, the reporting of games to the website was the best it has been in my three years as commissioner. I was very pleased overall in that I was able to complete standings when I wanted to without having to contact ADs repeatedly for results.

I was glad that both AA championships could be played this year. This led to more closely contest playoff games, which encourages students to continue playing rugby.

Apart from a few minor hiccups, this rugby season went quite smoothly. Thank you to all coaches and athletic directors for reporting scores on time, and making my job significantly easier.

4. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We must continue to emphasize the importance of coaches and ADs reporting scores and sending in game sheets.
- 2. It must also be emphasized that referees report ALL cards, red and yellow, so that the guidelines regarding foul play can be monitored. As well, player sent off reports must be completed and sent to Rick and me immediately following the game to allow enough time for the decision to be made for length of suspension.
- In regards to player suspensions, any time more than the minimum suspension is a
 possibility; we must develop a protocol to ensure that the punishment is
 appropriate.
- 4. I would like to suggest we hold a guidelines, key rules and question session before the beginning of the season for coaches and referees to attend. My suggestion would be that this would be held by myself and Darryl and we would go over key safety points, any rule changes, and areas that have caused confusion in recent years. I would ask that all coaches and referees attend, but at least 1 representative from each school be required to attend this session.
