Official's Commissioner Report
2013-14

The PEISAA member schools, along with the executive, and the provincial sport organization Officials' Associations, continue to have a healthy working relationship. As an Association, we continue to be supportive in helping to build the various Officials' Associations to improve the level of officiating and the number of officials taking part in school sport.

Sports officials represent a critical aspect of the sporting infrastructure, yet those responsible for officiating athletic contests are leaving sport at an alarming rate. Recruitment and retention continue to be a major hurdle. The average age of our team officials is very high and has put us in a critical situation for the near future. Every Officials' Association in PEI is experiencing difficulty in this area. Recruitment is an ongoing process. Few of the Associations would be considered as healthy with respect to the number of officials they are working with. Some Associations have shown considerable growth, in particular Rugby, while others are struggling. Recruitment and retention of officials in the extremities of the province in particular is challenging, thus adding to the increased costs of having referees officiate at those schools. On several occasions, games had to be rescheduled or canceled due to a lack of officials to referee games.

An ongoing concern is the number of incidents involving negative behavior directed toward officials during interscholastic play by players, coaches, and spectators. In several cases, an athlete, coach, or spectator was dismissed from the competition and/or asked to leave the playing area. Member schools must continue to be diligent in promoting fair play, and that these individuals must be responsible and encouraged to be respectful of our officials.

For the first time in recent memory, The PEISAA put into place a program to have high school aged officials, referee at the A Midget level. This was used during the Soccer season along with the Basketball season. Member schools can help in identifying and promoting officiating within their community to improve our officiating numbers in all areas of the province, thus reducing some of the financial burden placed on our schools. Though our official associations are continually on the recruitment and development trail, we too can help in identifying potential new candidates to the officiating ring.

Our sincerest thanks are extended to all officials throughout the province as they provide an incredible service and should be commended for their dedication and valuable contribution to School Athletics. Our appreciation is also noted to all the member schools and individuals who took on the responsibility of running events at the Provincial Track & Field Championships on such a rainy and windy day.

Congratulations to the 2014 PEISAA official of the year.

Subway Tournament Fund Committee Report
2013-14

Over recent years, Subway has been providing financial support to PEI High Schools to help cover tournament costs. In return, during the tournaments, high schools have been promoting Subway in various ways. For example, the Subway name has been included in the tournament name (ex – ‘Subway Basketball Classic’), Subway signage, Subway T-shirts, Subway player of the game, and etc.

During the 2012 – 2013 school year, Subway PEI informed the P.E.I.S.A.A that they no longer wanted to manage the distribution of funds to the high schools. The P.E.I.S.A.A was granted permission to allocate the funds each year based on the criteria that was developed and outlined in the Subway Tournament Fund Tournament Application. We were pleased that \$10,000 was set aside for the 2012-2013 school year and another \$10,000 for the 2013-2014 school year. For the 2014 – 2015 school year, the P.E.I.S.A.A is in the processing of securing another \$10,000 to help offset high school tournament costs.

Due to the delay of the application process during the 2012-2013 and the 2013-2014 school years, schools were provided the opportunity to still apply and receive funding if they met the criteria set forth in the application. To date, the P.E.I.S.A.A is current with all the procedures and policies that are outlined in the Subway Tournament Fund criteria.

During the 2012 – 2013 school year, three high schools have applied and \$4,500 in total was provided to help offset tournament costs. During the 2013 – 2014 school year, again, three schools applied and \$4,500 in total was provided to help offset tournament costs.

I strongly suggest that all high schools take the time to submit an application to the P.E.I.S.A.A. Thank-you to all schools who have applied and for hosting school tournaments. As we all know, there is a strong correlation between students who participate in school sports and student success.

Inclusion Committee Report
June 2014

Prince Edward Island's first inclusion summit was held on Tuesday, March 25th in Charlottetown Prince Edward Island (PEI). This event was a collaboration among the PEI Department of Education and Early Childhood Development, ParaSport and Recreation PEI, and the Canadian Paralympic Committee.

The summit included approximately 55 participants and brought together community leaders from the host committee organizations, staff from the English Language School Board (ELSB) Student Services team, the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development, Prince Edward Island Home and School Federation, Prince Edward Island School Athletic Association (PEISAA) and physical educators within the ELSB.

This report will provide a summary of the actions and recommendations that could be supported by the PEISAA as provided by participants of the summit and those participants who attended a follow up meeting that commenced shortly after the summit concluded. These actions and recommendations include:

- Appoint a PEISAA executive member to the inclusion committee
- Create after school inclusive sports programs or activities
- Increase parent awareness of the value of sport for students with a disability
- Help from the PEISAA for increasing student involvement in sport
- Continue to link with the PEISAA to promote opportunities for integration
- Inclusion should always be practiced
- Celebrate best inclusive practices
- Determine the first 1-2 opportunities for ParaSport options to be integrated into the PEISAA (zone and provincially)
- Build the categories for these PEISAA sports and promote them within the schools and to parents to spread the word
- Identify 2-3 people to be champions to begin the integration of ParaSport, these may be at the zone or school levels
- Direct educators to an online ParaSport schedule of events and equipment loan through the PEISAA website
- Increase parents' understanding of the impact of sport can have in the lives of children with disabilities by using the *Changing Mind, Changing Lives* program

Next steps to be considered is the creation and maintenance of a working group that would include a member of the PEISAA. Future topics in September 2014 to discuss include priority setting for the 2014-2015 school year.

This has had some success and will be continued in 2014-15

The Chair, Trent Ranahan reported that the dispersements for 2012-13 and 1013-14 have been sent out to the schools that applied and that applications have been received for 2014-15. No new applications will be accepted for 2014-15.

FALL SPORT REPORTS

PEISAA Senior Soccer: FINAL REPORT – 2013-14

1. SPORT PARTICIPATION NUMBERS

Male 12 teams and approximately 210 players *Female* 13 teams and approximately 230 players

2. GENERAL COMMENTS

The 2013 Fall Soccer Season was very entertaining. I spent more time this year getting to as many games as possible and was impressed with the skill level and competition. The season went very well. The final standings in both A leagues were quite competitive as tie-breakers were again needed to determine several positions in the play-offs. This is a great way to have your league finish as there was a great deal of parity. The AAA leagues were competitive for the most part as the final standings will attest. On the Championship Saturday, November 2nd, we experienced some great soccer matches under some of the best weather we had experienced in many years. We were treated to four very entertaining Championship games. Souris claimed “A” Men’s Gold defeating Evangeline 4-0, although the score was 1-0 with only 17 minutes left. In the “A” Women’s Gold Medal game, Rural defeated the Col. Gray Women 4-3 in overtime, with both teams scoring in overtime. The “AAA” Women’s game had #3 seeded Gray defeat the top seeded Rural women 2-0 in a close game that had both teams getting several chances. The “AAA” Men’s game was a very tightly contested game as well. The #2 seeded Gray upset #1 Rural 1-0 on a penalty shot in the final 10 minutes of the game. All of the Medal Games were well attended, especially the “AAA” games at UPEI where there were in excess of 500 spectators watching the gold medal games.

Many thanks go out to the assigners, Cory Deagle in the East and Richard Pettipas in the West. They did a terrific job making sure games were covered. Hats of to our officials for getting to the fields in “light hours,” we realize how difficult it is to get to the field at our kick-off times. Other thanks go out to Paperflow (Xerox and Sam Jeyes), The Department of Education and Early Childhood, Rick MacKinnon (PEISAA Sport Coordinator), Milk Sport and the Dairy Farmers of Canada, and the many coaches and players who provided many hours of entertaining soccer this fall.

Results were a process that was difficult to keep up with again this year. Athletic Directors need to be checking in with these on a more regular basis. Stats were updated weekly from results I received on the web site this year. Unfortunately, I was being corrected later in the year when play-off games are being set. I can only report or collate what I am given!

3. RECOMMENDATIONS

- a) Travel is an issue every year, and with budgets being cut, maybe we could have a few weekend tournaments throughout the season, in addition to some regularly scheduled games to take place of the long drives. For example, teams from the extremities could arrange to play in a central location against each other for two games, saving some travel. This would make for ease of officials as well. Teams could and should be utilizing the Cornwall turf fields for the same reasons. Double headers could be played during the week with two teams of officials covering the games
- b) Better reporting of games, need I say more!

- c) In speaking to the referee association, there are some concerns with a couple fields that have benches on each side of the field. This is not a good situation as one team tends to be sitting with a group of parents and/or students on a set of bleachers. It has been asked of me to recommend each school provide two benches on one side (opposite side from fans) so the teams can occupy one side and the fans the other. This is a FIFA standard and we should follow suit.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS:

The 2013 midget and high school field hockey league had to be one of the best seasons for weather and turf conditions. Only one game was rescheduled this was due to lack of officials. Lucky only one game had to be rescheduled in the 2013 compact season (as there appeared to be only one.) The new Shoot-out competition for overtime replaced the penalty stroke competition at both the junior & high school level. The midget final came down to the Shoot-out and we felt it was a very exciting finish. January, 2013 Field Hockey Canada added two new rules, which were added to this fall season. Field hockey numbers are growing and there is a need for more coaches. SIS had three young coaches, EWS had two new coaches, Queen Charlotte had one. So that is a step in the right direction.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

- Need to increase the number of umpires across the Province. Another umpire course will take place in September, 2014 for university and other interested people not only in the Charlottetown area but Summerside and Montague areas. Scheduling umpires in 2013 was a very difficult job due to lack of numbers. Before the season started, I looked at the calendar to see the number of days to schedule games. I was shocked to see very few days. This was due to Leadership Conference in Montague (this meant Montague started play on Sept 25). I was able to work around this event. However, Thanksgiving Weekend which also has the National Club Soccer Championships, Atlantic Hockey Tournament, both not only played on the weekend but (Club soccer) takes students out of classes three and four days before Thanksgiving plus another day after. This is then followed by PEI Teachers' Convention where we lose another two days to schedule games. So trying to schedule games to be fair to all teams was a nightmare! If the School Boards are requiring students not out of class until the end of the day then for sure there is a bigger problem with "out of season tournaments" being held by National Association.

- **Transportation:** As you know transportation is another huge problem. There were a number of games that were shortened (by 20 minutes or more) due to buses being late. Not only being late caused the game to be shortened but the home team, parents, and officials had to wait 45 minutes for a game to start, and also the visiting team did not get a proper warm-up. Then players, families, officials were late for other activities they had planned for the evening. This is unacceptable. Also 90% the games are scheduled on turf fields that are booked from 4:00pm to 5:30 or 6pm.
- To cut down on transportation for midget league games for Montague and SIS, the assigner will schedule a league tournament in early September, 2014 for Cornwall turf.
- The recommendation from 2012 high school all-star meeting was to schedule 2013 high school and midget quarter final games so that the team winning would have a school day to practice was well received. Although this did not happen for the midget 4/5 game where the team winning of 4/5 place game played Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday. The schedule for 2014 would schedule a school day for a practice.
- A question was asked if we need the 4/5 place playoff game and all coaches answered definitely yes! They felt with field hockey being a new sport for a lot of players that most of the season is used for teaching skills, learning the game and giving each player an opportunity to play throughout the season as they build towards the playoffs. The 4/5 place game is required!
- **IMPORTANT TO CHECK THE CALENDAR FOR 2013 SEASON.** The lack of playing days might mean playing the Championships into November. This was a 2012 recommendation...again I will check the calendar and to see what is available for league games and championships. I **RECOMMEND THAT THE 2014 CHAMPIONSHIPS BE HELD THE WEEK OF October 27- 30, 2014** for both high school and midget.
- **Uniforms/socks:** All school teams need to wear school uniform colours and must be numbered. The biggest problem is team socks. If we are to follow the FHC rule book, Teams must wear the same colour.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

- a) The majority of schools were reliable and punctual for reporting match results on-line. Thank you for your co-operation and professionalism. If 100% of ADs could master this task, it would make reporting, stat keeping, match scheduling and the overall communication so efficient.
- b) The website continued to facilitate score keeping and scheduling, etc., Great job and congratulations to our web technicians!
- c) Compared to previous seasons, where some schools needed to be reminded of the rule concerning changing and exposing bare skin on the court between warm-up and game time, this was not an issue this season. Thank you to all whom helped reinforce this rule in all of our Island gyms.
- d) Thank you to officials for their work this season. A reminder to please help train score keepers and have officials verify and ensure that all information is documented on official score sheets, including date, competition (A, AAA, women or men), school names, etc. which facilitate the commissioner's job immensely in keeping accurate statistics, especially during the play-offs and provincials. Officials need to make it a priority to complete the entire score sheet before they sign off; ask coaches/ captains/ ADs to quickly go over score sheets and fill in any missing blanks before leaving – thank you for your co-operation!
- e) Thank you to our partners: PEI Government – Dept. of Education and Early Childhood Development, PEI School Milk Foundation (awards), Dairy Farmers of Canada, Subway (Irwin Dawson), Comfort Inn (Shawna Grandjean), UPEI Athletics (Bill Schurman), Holland College Athletics (Albert Roche), Provincial Host Venues (Three Oaks Senior High School and Holland College Centre for Community Engagement), and the numerous volunteers etc. without whom, it would be very difficult to provide such a rich sport program to PEI's high school athletes.
- f) Thank you to all PEISAA executive members, athletic directors, volunteers, coaches, parents, school staff, bus drivers, student councils, leadership classes, and everyone else involved who so generously devote their time and energy to help and support and enhance our school sports and ultimately the young developing athletes' overall experiences.
- g) Thank you to PEISAA's School Athletics Coordinator Rick MacKinnon. All your time and energy and hard work are all very much appreciated. We recognize that your responsibilities are very extensive and most of it is done without any recognition. Thank you Rick, you are very much appreciated.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS

- a) More consistent officiating throughout the regular league season which carries into the provincial tournament. Assign the same officials from the regular league games to the provincial games so that teams do not meet a new official at the Provincials. More consistent calls from one official to another (ex. When a double-touch is called) within each league. There was a huge improvement this year and we hope that it continues.
- b) Offer skills clinics early-on in the season to help the volunteer coaches who may have less technical skills and sport knowledge to teach the athletes (a volunteer parent made this request). This would also help prevent any injury and the development of poor techniques, which become bad habits that are difficult to break.
- c) Young and inexperienced student scorekeepers need to be trained by the Athletic Director or another person they deem qualified, prior to scoring their first match. They need to observe and be mentored for a few matches prior to be left alone to score-keep. Play-off and provincial matches should not be score-kept with first time score-keepers.
- d) As the website becomes more and more efficient every year, I recommend that all ADs (or supervise their coaches/captains to do so) diligently submit their game results by the evening deadline. We will then be able to eliminate the need to fax game report forms, saving time and paper. 4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The 2013-14 Midget golf season was the first full fall season where proper planning time was available. The result was an increase in the number of schools participating as well as a rise in participation numbers. Coaches felt that their athletes were much better prepared for the season after playing all summer. The qualifying scores and Provincial Championship results would appear to lead to that conclusion as well.

This year 85 boys and 18 girls were involved in the qualifying tournaments with 55 moving on to the Provincials hosted at Avondale Golf Club. Two 9 hole qualifying tournaments were held in each of the competing Divisions.

The championship qualification format used changed this year with two divisions representing the East and the West sending three teams each plus a wildcard team to the Provincial Championships, with the addition of allowing individual competitors to qualify. This resulted in 37 boys and 18 girls being involved in the championship. The championship was hosted at Avondale Golf Club with a very reasonable green fee of \$20 being charged for the boy's 18 hole championship and \$10 for the girl's 9 hole championship.

Avondale's Director of Golf, Scott Larsen and his staff must be thanked for the terrific work they did to help facilitate the championship.

Thanks to all the coaches for the time they put into this year's golf season, they continue to try and promote the inclusion of girls in their program and the numbers are up, though work needs to be done on skill development.

Thanks to Rick MacKinnon for all the advice and administrative help.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS:

- a) Emphasize the importance of administrating the qualifying tournaments through the office of the zone representatives.
- b) Maintain the 2 division championship qualification format, with the addition of individual participants qualifying and a wildcard team for the Provincial Championships.
- c) With midget schools playing in the fall, it is important that the qualifying tournaments be scheduled in the spring to insure the fall qualification tournament schedule is completed in time for the Provincial Championships.
- d) The PEISAA has identified the need for all sports administered through the schools to have a season. If golf is going to meet this expectation then schools must commit to playing in at least 2 qualifying tournaments played on separate dates. There should be time between these qualifiers to allow for some skill development. Realistically, if this is not scheduled than golf at the Midget level should not be a Provincial Championship sport.
- e) Establish a Provincial Championship Tournament format that would allow the Holland College 1st year golf administration class the opportunity to help facilitate the championship.
- f) The PEISAA should form a committee to look at the viability of Midget Golf as a PEISAA Championship sport.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS:

This year twenty-nine teams competed in the regular season as part of the competition leading to the play-downs in interscholastic high school basketball. Approximately three hundred and fifty student athletes took their places on the court as members of these teams.

A seeding committee was created and the athletic directors met in mid-November to put a schedule of games in place. This was not a balanced schedule. The members of the seeding committee were asked to study the results from the games and to rank the teams. Two mid-season and a third post-season ranking placed the teams in order from one through fifteen in girls play and one through fourteen in boys.

The seeders recognized the importance of the role that they played. As a result they deliberated for hours on these relative rankings. A large number of e-mails were exchanged from one member to another. In the end three sets of divisional play-offs were arranged directly from the rankings at the A, AA and AAA levels. All the teams which had competed during the regular season were awarded spots in the play-off competition.

Quarter-final, semi-final and final competitions were slated for each division except for the A boys where there was no quarter-final action. The quarter-final action was hosted by the better ranked team in each

case. Semi-finals and finals at the A level were hosted by Bluefield high school. Semis and finals for AA and AAA were hosted by Holland College.

All stars were chosen by the coaches. The Athletic Directors had decided in November not to have any all star competition this year.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS:

- a) Consider hosting the championships once again at Holland College.
 - Holland College was very cooperative and excited to host the SAA.
 - The venue, which many had considered to be too small, proved to have the capacity necessary.
 - Washroom access was a problem.
 - Security needs to be revisited.
 - The television coverage was a bonus.
 - More floor seating should be a possibility.
 - Dates should be established at the fall AGM.
- b) If there are once again fourteen or more teams in each league, there should be play-offs in which six teams take part in each division's quarter-finals. The losers of the quarters should remain alive, instead of being eliminated after one play-off game, and should compete in the semis of the next division as the top seeds. This guarantees everyone two or more play-off games except for the losers of the A quarter-finals. Furthermore I suggest that any teams ranked lower than fourteenth place not be scheduled for any play-off action. The possibility of an all star game should be reconsidered.
- c) The commissioner and/or the School Sport Coordinator should forward a summary of the November A.D's meeting to the Athletic Directors so they are reminded of all major points of discussion at the November meeting. The major points should be highlighted on the front page of the SAA website so that officials, coaches, fans and the A.D's themselves are reminded or made aware of the format in place.
- d) We have an excellent product in our Website itself. The Website should be a major point of emphasis for next year. We should do everything we can to make it user-friendly and mistake free AND it should be promoted by all involved in the SAA as much as possible.
- e) Referee recruitment and development remains a problem in virtually every SAA sport.
- f) There should be some discussion about marking on gymnasias floors to see if we are comfortable as to whether these markings are remaining current enough for our sports. An implementation plan may, or may not, be deemed necessary for the future.

4. General Comments:

Overall, I thought the midget basketball season ran very smoothly. Game reports, for the most part, were faxed in on time and results were accurate. Any games cancelled were re-scheduled right away. The main issue was the amount of games that were forced to be rescheduled because of a shortage of officials in covering our growing "A" leagues.

In November, Ted Johnston facilitated a clinic at Stonepark School covering the basics of zone and man-to-man defence and what was legal for our midget groups to play. This was organized so our coaches would be familiar with what type of defence was acceptable at the midget level.

I attended the "A" Provincial Championships in Souris and would like to congratulate Lukas McCormack and his team of volunteers and minor officials for hosting a well run event.

5. Recommendations:

- a) Stay with the man-to-man defense but prior to the start of the basketball season, have a clinic for coaches and referees responsible for the midget games to demonstrate what is legal in a man-to-man and what is considered zone.

- b) Have protocol in place in dealing with coaches who continue to ignore the no zone rule. Make AD's and their coaches aware of the protocol.
- c) If we move to the high school model where teams make up their schedule including 1 or 2 point games and rank the teams at the end of the season for "A" or "AA" status, teams will not have to repeatedly face the same teams and the same results for an entire season. Both the "A" and "AA" leagues showed a number of one-sided games. Another option might be to keep "A" divisions in the East and West but combine the

4. General Comments

The 2014 school gymnastics season ended on Saturday, February 22nd with the PEI School Athletic Association Provincial Gymnastics Championship at Kensington Intermediate Senior High School. The championship was hosted by St. Louis Elementary School.

Provincial team titles: Pre-Novice Boys- West Kent Elementary, Pre-Novice Girls- West Kent Elementary - Novice Girls- West Kent Elementary, Novice Boys- Athena Consolidated, Bantam Girls - Montague Intermediate. The top five scores on each event were used to calculate the team standing. Individual awards were also given to the top six vault /floor routines and top ten all around.

A total of 304 gymnasts participated at this year's event. This was a decrease of 13 gymnasts

from last year's event. The biggest drop was with the bantam and midget categories.

On Saturday morning the competition started and finished on time. A total of 148 gymnasts participated with 88 Pre-Novice Girls and 60 Pre-Novice Boys. Increase of 6

On Saturday afternoon, another big crowd watched 127 gymnasts perform in the Novice Boys, Novice Girls categories, 49 Novice Boys and 78 Novice Girls. Decrease of 2.

The late afternoon had a total of 29 gymnasts participate in Bantam Boys and Girls, Midget Boys and Girls categories, 2 Bantam Boys, 15 Bantam Girls, 3 Midget Boys and 9 Midget Girls. Decrease of 17.

All information and results were posted in the three local papers and two radio stations. The media coverage before and after was very good. All results were circulated the next day to all the media, schools and on our SAA website within days of our championship.

We had a total of 24 different schools from across PEI participate with a total of 304 gymnasts, a decrease of 13 gymnasts.

We also had two new schools, O'Leary Elementary and l'École Pierre Chiasson.

The weather cooperated with us and traveling was great.

We had a total of 474 paid spectators. This also was an increase of 25 paid spectators.

Our computer program which calculated the results came through for us again. Within minutes of the end of both competitions, the results were handed out. Thank you so much to Debbie Murphy who helped with the presentation of all our awards.

I would like to say a special thank you to Garth Turtle and the SAA executive for your support in helping with the rescheduling of the championship to the following weekend.

I would also like to thank Logan Roche and Donald Milligan for all their help and continuous support. Thank you for allowing us to use your fine facility to host our Provincial Championship. It is very much appreciated.

We can't forget PEI School milk Foundation for their continuous support and of course for the free chocolate milk for all the competitors.

Thank you to all the Unit managers for hosting their own zone competitions and sending me all the results on time. I would like to say a special thank you to all the Phys. Ed. teachers for supporting me and the change of date of our championship. It was greatly appreciated. It's always a pleasure to work with such dedicated professionals. Great job!

5. Recommendations for improving the sport:

- a) I passed out a survey to all coaches at provincial asking if we needed some changes to our technical package. I received a few recommendations for new skills to be added to our list of skills. I will pass those recommendations out to the school for their input.
- b) That we look at our vaults for Pre-Novice to Midget categories and see if coaches would like to eliminate the straddle and squat vaults and replace it with a handspring vault to flat back on a 100 cm mat. This might have financial implications if schools don't have the proper mats. I will pass that recommendation to all schools for their input.

P.E.I.S.A.A. Wrestling Final Commissioner's Report 2013-14

Commissioners: Tim Murphy and Megan Morrison

1. General Comments

The 2014 P.E.I.S.A.A. Wrestling Championships were held on Friday evening for the Bantam and Midget divisions and on Saturday for the Novice competitors. The site was Montague Regional High School. 2 surfaces were used on Friday evening. 3 surfaces were used with the novice division competition. With appropriate numbers of on mat officials this made the tournament run much more smoothly.

The on mat official situation was strong as we had from 6 – 8 officials available at different times. This was one of the success factors for the tournament. Our level of officiating was quite high and there were enough to keep the standard high throughout the day.

The numbers of wrestlers continues to be an issue at the older levels. Some of the quality of wrestling was quite high at times. Numbers at the Novice level declined due to the rule changes at that level. There has been some interest in developing a Pre-Novice division.

The number of changes in the sport over the past year seemed to work smoothly. This was primarily due to the flexibility of the coaches involved. All on mat rule changes were implemented and modified to maximize athlete safety. An example of this is where a standing double leg to the back is worth four points. This now becomes a much more prominent attack, but Novice was required to go to a knee to ensure safety. All other rule changes by C.A.W.A. were implemented as per age level rules.

The changes for age groups worked smoothly. The numbers dropped at the Novice level with the removal of grade 3 & 4 athletes. The point system for athletes winning by default also went smoothly. The current system where an athlete is scheduled to fight, but has a no show may need to be defined as to when this is made known to the draw-master so teams points can be awarded appropriately.

Overall this was a very successful event. The challenge is to continue to develop the sport into the Intermediate to a greater degree and then into the high schools. The team results are listed on page 2 of this report

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

The PEISAA/Black Knight provincial badminton championships were held on Thursday April 24 and Saturday April 26, at 5 Charlottetown and area locations.

Championship titles in novice, bantam, midget, juvenile and senior boys and girls' categories were all up for grabs in singles, doubles and mixed play. Most of our Island schools were represented in zone playoffs, with the top two from the four zones advancing to the provincials.

Jesse Cameron from Three Oaks was victorious in senior boy's singles defeating Joel Arsenault from Evangeline 21-18, 20-22 and 21-13 to win the provincial title. This was the second year in a row the final was played between the two with almost identical scores. Matt Barlow of Three Oaks defeated Ben Keefe of Bluefield 21-15 and 21-18 to claim the senior boys bronze medal. In doubles action Owen Arsenault and Jesse Cameron from TOSH defeated Connor Loerick and Matt Barlow of TOSH 21-17 and 21-17 to win the title. The bronze medal was won by Westisle, with Oliver Doucette and Keenan Wilkie defeating fellow Wolverines Brett Alward and Kent Doucette 17-21, 21-16 and 21-12. With a first and second in doubles and a first and third in singles TOSH won the provincial title with 15 points.

In girls' action, Tiffany Cameron of Three Oaks defeated Jacqueline Hughes of Evangeline 21-9 and 21-12 to win the senior girls provincial singles championship. Hailey Matthews of Westisle defeated Olivia Adams of Gray 21-9 and 21-16 to claim the bronze medal in singles. Kelly Curley and Jessica Gillis of Three Oaks defeated Emma Hughes and Ashley Richard 21-17 and 21-17 to win the senior girls doubles championship. Keira Coady and Hannah Stevenson of Bluefield claimed the bronze medal. Three Oaks won the provincial championship with a total of 10 points.

Senior Mixed Doubles champions this year were Jacqueline Hughes and Joel Arsenault from Evangeline. They defeated Kiera Coady and Ben Keefe from Bluefield 21-12 and 21-18. Jessica Gillis and Connor Loerick from Three Oaks defeated Hailey Matthews and Kent Doucette of Westisle 21-18 and 21-19 to win the bronze medal. Evangeline wins the senior mixed provincial title with 5 points.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT

Running the championships in the Charlottetown schools worked very well this year. Using 5 schools on Thursday night was challenging but it worked. It can work again next

year. Saturday went very smooth at all three locations. Having the championship on Thursday and Saturday went very well. It gave the athletes a chance to rest before the finals. We should do this again next year for the third year in a row.

Having players report scores if they were going to a third game on the Thursday night; worked very well. This way the first two game scores were accurate and if they have to go to a tie breaker, correct scores were used. It should be used in future zones and provincials.

Now that we are having a rest day on Friday we should use this day to send a report to the schools on the results from the Thursday night. I recommend that on Friday morning a report from each Thursday night location be sent to the commissioner. Once they are all in they should be sent to all schools so that Athletic Directors can make sure that their players are ready to go for Saturday.

Lastly, the point totals used to determine Provincial Champions in each division may have to be looked at as we have ties every year. I am not sure that we should have as many ties as we do every year.

The first week of June is a nightmare for this group and I really appreciate their efforts. I would also like to thank Jeff Ellsworth for his work hosting the provincial play downs. Thank you to Frank MacDonald, Wayne MacDonald, Dave McNeill, and Roger Gallant for their work in assigning the officials.

5. Recommendations for Improving Sport

- a. Maintain the playoff system that was in place this year. Having only the medal games on Ch'ship day allowed the competing teams to have their pitchers rested and provided a much better game.

- b. Maintain the provincial quarter-finals format with competition between the two divisions (East vs. West). This should mean that the best teams will meet in the Championships.

4. GENERAL COMMENTS

This rugby season was another successful one. Student-athletes from all across the Island competed in 3 divisions in men's and women's championships. As with every school sport, it would not have been possible without countless hours of work by players, coaches, referees and Athletic Directors. A special thank you goes to Garth Turtle for taking on the responsibility of School Sport Coordinator and helping out behind the scenes. Also, thank you to Darryl Boudreau for his continued work as Referee Assignor. Credit should also be given to Chris Huggan, Logan Roche and Joel Arsenault for successfully hosting the provincial championships this year. There are many other people who are very key to the continued success of high school rugby on PEI and I thank them as well.

As is the case every year in A rugby, the transformation from athletes with little knowledge of the game at the start of the year to players who understand what to do is amazing to watch. The 8s version of the game is also important in helping the student-

athletes to adjust to playing a contact sport while maintaining the safety and sportsmanship aspects that each coach should be insisting on. Both A leagues came down to very competitive championships with Colonel Gray defeating Three Oaks in the women's final and Three Oaks beating Colonel Gray in the men's final.

In the AA division, it was very impressive of Kensington to continue fighting through their season despite the low numbers on their team. They were competitive in both men's and women's AA. The introduction of 11s introduces some new possibilities that I would like to see followed up on in future years should the circumstances present themselves again. In the AAA regular season, both men's and women's divisions were very competitive and tightly matched. In the AA championships, Colonel Gray proved to be the best in the women's division while Montague beat Westisle in the men's final. In the AAA championships, Three Oaks beat Charlottetown Rural in the men's and women's finals after having lost their regular season matchups.

This season, the submission of game sheets to me was poor yet again. Scanning and email pdfs to me was an option, as well as sending jpeg files via email or text message. I also have been allowed to provide the Charlottetown Rural fax number as an option over the past 4 years, but I still do not receive anywhere near all of the game sheets. On a positive note, every game was reported to the website this year, with very few taking more than a few hours to be reported. This is far better than it has ever been in my time as commissioner. I would also like to thank Walter MacEwen for his work in completing the Results Grid on the PEISAA website. This made it very easy for me to complete standings this year, and I appreciate it.

Thank you to everyone for their continued work to make high school rugby a success.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS FOR IMPROVING SPORT

- a. The state of rugby refereeing on PEI needs to be addressed and we need to work with the PEI Rugby Union to recruit and develop new and existing officials. The number of A referees is not a problem but the number of AA and AAA referees continues to decline. This problem is compounded by a number of our top officials being high school coaches so we need to try to recruit outside of the high school coaches if possible.
- b. We should look into an alternative method of sending in game sheets. I don't receive all of them so I have been going off the scores on the website only for the past 2 years.

- c. I did not receive many yellow card reports despite this being mentioned at the referee's course before the season. This needs to be emphasized if we are going to enforce the card system in the Guidelines.
- d. I would like to, again, suggest that we hold a Guidelines, key rules and question session before the beginning of the season for coaches and referees to attend. My suggestion would be that this would be held by myself and Darryl and we would go over key safety points, any rule changes, and areas that have caused confusion in recent years. I would ask that all coaches and referees attend, but at least 1 representative from each school be required to attend this session.

4. General Comments:

The 3rd Annual PEISAA Triton was held on May 19, 2104. Students from thirteen schools swam, biked and ran the course at Credit Union Place, the Summerside boardwalk, Rufus St., Mackenzie Dr., Notre Dame St., and Northumberland St.

Triathlon Directors, CJ Studer and Cheryl Tanton registered 96 triathletes from bantam through to senior for the event. Cheryl Tanton was head official and she was aided by lifeguards, police and fire personnel and adult volunteers on the road.

As safety was of utmost concern trained first aid personnel were present, with key individuals always in radio communication. Pathways were swept clean and detailed course information was given at the athlete's pre event meeting. The Summerside Police and Fire Departments were informed of the event and assisted in securing the road sections of the triathlon.

As this is an event that celebrates the intrinsic value of sport, there were no Provincial Champions declared or banners awarded. Each triathlete received a Triton t-shirt as they finished the course. Times were taken to give the athletes a goal for improvement next year. No times were shared among the schools or zones, thus no results were published. Each participant is a champion in their own right.

This model of participation is foundational in the sport of triathlon and is a model in which the race directors feel very strongly about.

The adopted model of registering and prepaying prior to the triathlon made registration on the morning of the event run smoothly.

The facilities at Credit Union Place work perfectly for this event. Due to unforeseen time conflicts, the bike and run course were changed. With unwavering support from the Summerside Chief of Police, appropriate roads were blocked off and the course was made secure for our triathletes.

The Triton could not be delivered if it were not for the work of the army of volunteers from Athena, Summerside Intermediate, Three Oaks, and dedicated parents/adults. They are critical to the success of the event and provided educational opportunities and service learning hours for these students.

This event is also a partnership with Triathlon PEI. This event needs their support through the use of their equipment. This event has been extensively covered by the media and has been a very positive experience for the athletes, volunteers and spectators.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS:

- a. With the new design of the bike/run course, more adults are needed to support high traffic areas. Therefore it is recommended that along with the vast number of youth volunteers, more adult volunteers be sought after.
- b. The majority of schools who have entered triathletes have been doing so for the past three years. It would be a pleasure to see more schools register in the triathlon and create a community of student triathletes in the province.
- c. The PEI Phys Ed Association should be encouraged to create a teacher's division of the Triton. The teachers would be insured through TriPEI, as the students are, and the PEISAA would not hold any responsibility.

In all, I see the Triton growing in the future as many AD's are promoting the day at their schools, which is evident with the number of students attending.
